Washington DC Trip

After a year of fundraising and working events, 37 students and 14 Chaperones headed out on Monday, October 9th for the annual 8th grade trip to the Washington, D.C. area. Day one was spent traveling to Chicago, IL with an afternoon stop at the Museum of Science and Industry and then a walk to Lake Michigan. We then boarded the bus in the late afternoon and headed to Pennsylvania with our first night spent sleeping on the Warco Transportation charter bus.

We arrived early in Gettysburg on Tuesday, October 10, Day 2, and enjoyed breakfast and freshening up at the Donner House. morning was spent on a guided tour of the Gettysburg Visitor Center enjoying a Cyclorama Film and Painting of the battle and then we toured the battlefields. We climbed the Long Street Tower, from which we saw a 360degree view of the Gettysburg Battlefields, and stopped at the Pennsylvania memorial. After lunch, we headed to Mount Vernon, Virginia the home of our 1st President, George Washington and his family. Two of our students, Sam Hoffman and Landon Copsey, participated in a memorial service in the cemetery for the slaves of Mount Vernon. We enjoyed a guided tour of the home and beautiful grounds next to the Potomac River. We also saw the original and new tombs of George Washington, then onward we traveled to Washington, D.C. After a quick supper at the Pentagon City Mall, we loaded the bus and had a night tour of the United States Air Force Memorial and the Iwo Jima Marine Corp Memorial. After a full day, we reached our hotel in time for the students to enjoy a quick swim before bedtime.



Washington DC, continues

After a breakfast at our hotel on Day 3, Wednesday, October 11, we headed to downtown Washington, D.C. to meet our guide on Pennsylvania Ave. We walked to the White House for a group photo and enjoyed seeing historical monuments in the park along the way. We enjoyed daytime views of the Washington Monument and other historic landmarks of DC. We stopped at the Thomas Jefferson and Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorials, then arrived at Arlington Cemetery for a guided tour. We viewed the ceremony of the "Changing of the Guards" and four River Ridge students participated in the "Wreath Laying Ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier." Congratulations to Asher Achenbach, Aayden Kreul, Zoey Neeley, and Landon Copsey on a great job! We also saw the eternal flame at the grave of President John F. Kennedy, and his brother, Robert. We saw the amazing view of Washington, D.C. from the front of the Arlington House (had been the estate of Confederate general Robert E. Lee's wife, Mary Anna Lee) before departing for lunch at the food court of the Ronald Reagan Building. In the afternoon, we visited Ford's Theater and listened to the story of the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln. We also toured the museum and the Peterson House across the street, where he died hours later. Our next stop was the National Archives to view the Constitution, The Bill of Rights and the Declaration of Independence. We had a quick supper at the Pentagon Mall before loading the bus and meeting our guide for a night

tour of the Washington Monument, the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, the Vietnam Women's Memorial, the Lincoln Memorial, the Washington Mall Reflecting Pool, the Korean War Veterans Memorial, and the World War II Memorial. It was an interesting and amazing day and we returned to our hotel after 10:00 PM.

On our last day, Thursday, October 12, we had breakfast and loaded up the motorcoach before heading to the United States Capitol and its visitor center. We were given a guided tour, which explained the history of the architecture and the many statues and paintings inside. We gathered for a group picture in front of the statue of Robert M. LaFollette from Wisconsin and in front of the Capitol Building before departing for lunch in the Ronald Reagan Building. Our afternoon was spent in a sobering tour of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. In the late afternoon, we took our last steps in DC and loaded the bus for home. We saw the

Department of Agriculture, the African American Memorial Museum, views of the Washington Monument and other large memorials as we left the city. We stopped a few times on the way home for food and breaks and did our best to sleep in the over 900 mile trip back to Wisconsin. We reached River Ridge School at around 6:00 AM on Friday, October 13.

Thank you to Tim Hoffman and Warco Transportation for a wonderfully planned trip and to our drivers...Darrell Noethe, Cooper, Steve Dilley and Dan Leamy for getting us to and from Washington, D.C. safely. A huge thank you goes to the group officers, parents, and chaperones for their generosity and hard work before and during the trip. Thank you to the River Ridge School District for supporting this trip. It was a wonderful educational experience for all!

School Receives Donation



Collision Specialist of Fennimore and Livingston ran a Back to School Fundraiser to help raise funds for area schools. Several of their customers chose River Ridge School to support. On behalf of the entire staff, they presented Mr. Clay Koenig with a check to support

programming for students.

This year Collision Specialist raised \$9,600 for local schools serving 15 different districts. The company feels that the communities are built on our schools and look forward to this annual fundraiser. Since 2012 they have donated over \$46,000 to our area schools.

What's this Referendum Talk?

If you have been paying attention to the Board agendas and some articles in the paper, you have most likely noticed talks of referendums starting to ramp up. There are many things that have gone into these conversations, and there will be many more conversations to come. At River Ridge, we will be going to an operational referendum in April. We have engaged with Wisconsin Public Finance to ensure we will be communicating the correct information and to make sure our request to the public is accurate and explainable. The operational referendum will fund only operating expenses such as utilities, staffing, programming, transportation, etc.

All public schools are feeling the mounting pressure of record inflation and uncertain state funding. These operating referendums have become a lifeline for school districts across the state. Just last April, there were 81 school referendums on ballots, and this April, the state is projecting another high volume, so once again, this problem is not unique to River Ridge. The reality is that revenue limits for public schools have been frozen in 6 of the past 9 school years, with a small increase this year per pupil. We will see an additional \$325 per pupil, but the impact of that is only an approximate 2% increase from last year to this year in revenue. In the 21-22 and 22-23 school years, the district received no increased revenue from the state, so the 2% increase actually covers a three- year period in which the inflation rates were around 7% in 21-22, 6.5% in 22-23, and a projected 3.7% in 23-24. To couple this with Wisconsin's per-pupil spending from 2002-2020 being the third smallest of any state, there is a huge need for an operating referendum.

In the future, you will see more information about this operating referendum and we will do our best to get meaningful information out in a timely manner. In the meantime, please reach out with any questions, concerns, or thoughts that you might have.

NHS Blood Drive







Earth day is April 23, 2023 so plan ahead for our annual recycling project, "Battle of the Cans" between the 4K-4th grade elementary classrooms.




